The reliance on public transport reduces costs and enhances the system's sustainability.

3. Final Delivery

Upon reaching the destination area, the tiffin boxes are handed over to another set of Dabbawalas who deliver them to the customers' workplaces. The entire process is synchronized to ensure timely delivery, often within a narrow time window during lunch hours.
